High Commissioner Bootle said it is shared culture and values that make Australia and Vanuatu good partners and friends.

"These values – equality of opportunity, strength of culture, democracy and a resilient, open economy – are what make us work so well together.

"Our partnership is premised on action: not only what we do and deliver together, but how we do it."

When reflecting on 2023, including the three high impact cyclones Vanuatu faced in eight months, High Commissioner Bootle said it is through this strong partnership and resolve for swift action that Australia can respond so rapidly to Vanuatu's needs.



President of the Republic of Vanuatu His Excellency Nikenike Vurobaravu said Australia had been a steadfast partner of Vanuatu, from playing a pivotal role in Vanuatu's journey to independence to contributing very significantly to Vanuatu's growth.

"The history of cooperation forms the foundation of our strong ties we share today," said President Vurobaravu.

"I would like to express the Vanuatu Government's unwavering commitment to further strengthen our partnership with Australia. Together we are not only stronger, but also capable of achieving remarkable feats."

President Vurobaravu also acknowledged Hans Ahwang, a Moa Island man from the Torres Strait Islands in Australia, who performed on the evening.

"Your performance touched our hearts," said President Vurobaravu.

Ahwang grew up learning traditional dances from his family and community and went on to train at the National Aboriginal Islander Skills Development Association (NAISDA).
